The performance included Eric Whitacre’s setting of “Goodnight Moon” and Brooke Pierson’s “Psalm 74,” which is based on Pavel Chesnokov’s communion hymn “Salvation is Created.” The Wind Symphony also performed several Christmas pieces, including “C’est Noel!” by Andre Jutras, “Ring the Bells on Christmas Day!” by Ed Huckleby, and “A Christmas Festival” by Leroy Anderson, which all weave together familiar Christmas songs.

The Hillsdale Wind Symphony is open to members of the community as well as Hillsdale College students, faculty, and staff. The group rehearses from 7-9 p.m. on Tuesdays in the Howard Music Building and performs standard band and wind ensemble repertoire with full instrumentation.
